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What I Should Already Know:

Sikhism celebrates Diwali, the Festival of Light, comes at the end of October or early November.

Langar is community kitchen in a Gurdwara where free meals are served to all visitors.

Dastar Bandi is a special ceremony when a Sikh boy starts tying the turban.

In the Sikh holy book, the Guru Granth Sahib, creation is described by the Gurus.

Gurdwara: A place where the holy book, Guru Granth Sahib, is kept. It is also a Sikh place of worship.

Vaisakhi: is the Sikh New Year and is celebrated on the 13th or 14th of April. It now marks a significant historical event for Sikhs, as it is the date of the founding of the Sikh community - the 'Khalsa'.

The Sikh place of worship is called a **Gurdwara** which means 'Gateway to Guru'. A Gurdwara is any building where the Guru Granth Sahib is kept.

The Guru Granth Sahib is a collection of lessons from the ten gurus. It is kept on a raised platform under a canopy in the Sikh place of worship. All Sikhs take off their shoes when they are near it.

Sikhism was founded by a man called **Guru**Nanak. Guru Nanak is considered the first Sikh

Guru. Sikhism is based on his teachings and those
of the nine Sikh Gurus who followed him.
