What I Should Already Know:

To reflect on their own experience of and feelings about colour.

To become aware of the beauty and variety of colour in the natural world.

Diwali is a new year festival with people sending cards, sharing special food and lighting divas.

Jesus is the central figure of Christianity, Jesus preached wherever people would gather together. He often taught through telling short stories with important messages, through parables.

The Ancient Greek people told many stories featuring their gods and goddesses. These are called myths and legends.

Unit Specific Vocabulary:

Emotions are also called **feelings**, like being happy or mad or scared. You **feel** them because of what you see, hear, remember, and do. So whether you're sad and blue or happy and excited, you can share your **feelings** with other people by talking about them.

Vestments: Garments and articles worn by religious groups

Clergy: A body of people ordained to serve the church

Pentecost: A religious celebration

Liturgy: Public worship performed by a religious group

Parable: A parable is a story with a hidden message about God or Heaven. They were Jesus' favourite method of teaching because people like listening to stories and can work out the meanings for themselves.

Christianity: A religion based on a belief in God and the life and teachings of Jesus.
