Summer 2	<ul> <li>Ritual bathing in the Ganges is an important part of Hindu pilgrimage.</li> <li>All Christian Churches have rituals involving the use of water. Children may be Christened using holy water or adults can be baptised.</li> <li>Baptism is mentioned in the Bible when Jesus was baptised by John in the River Jordan in Israel.</li> <li>Muslims use water to wash before each of their five daily prayers or before handling the Qur'an.
