They believe they have a special agreement with God called a covenant. Jews promise to obey God's laws to say thank you to him for looking after them Jews believe a man called Abraham was the first person to make a covenant with God. The Jewish holy book is known as the Tanakh or Hebrew Bible. The word Tanakh comes from the first letters of the three different parts of the book Hanukkah is the Jewish Festival of Lights. The word 'Hanukkah' means 'Dedication' in Hebrew. It celebrates a miracle that happened in Jerusalem over 2,000 years ago.

- > Passover is a celebration of the story of **Exodus**. During Passover, Jews remember how their ancestors left slavery behind them when they were led out of Egypt by Moses.

- > Passover is celebrated with a series of rituals. Each ritual symbolises a different part of the story.
