Line – A long mark or stroke

Unit 1: Drawing

Shape – The form or outline of an object

Portrait – a painting, drawing, photograph or sculpture of a person

Draw – To produce a picture or diagram using lines

Self-portrait – a painting, drawing, photograph or sculpture of yourself

Line drawing – a drawing done completely in lines

Detail - to add features

Bold - strong

Size – how large it is

Light – how bright something is

Dark – how dull something is

Outline – the outside of a drawing

Sketch - a light drawing

Shading – the levels of darkness on the paper.

Grades of pencils / hardness - Pencils come in a range of hardness from H pencils which are hard (and lighter) to B pencils which are very soft (and darker).

Mark making - Used to describe the different lines, patterns, and textures we create in a piece of art. It applies to any art material on any surface, not only paint on canvas or pencil on paper.

Foreground – the ground or things placed in front of the picture.

Background – The ground or parts of the scene that are behind the main subject of the work.

Technique – A way of carrying out a particular task.

Observe	Look closely at what you are drawing.
	Look closely at the size of objects.
Compare	Look at what you have drawn and
'	the work of the artist.
Good pencil grip	Check your pencil grip and pressure.
Avoid accidental	Work with care. Don't rub over your
smudging	drawing with your hand, arm or
	sleeve.
Use smudging	Can you smudge the marks? How
selectively	does that effect your drawing?
Vary your lines	Try using longer lines and shorter
	lines.
Show tones	Where can you see light and dark
	areas in the subject matter?
	Can you show this in your drawings?
